

Items of Extraordinary Value

Certain items in your shipment may be considered items of extraordinary value. These items are defined as having a value greater than \$100 per pound, per article. Such items must be specifically identified, and our agents must receive a written declaration of their presence on the *Extended Protection Program* form. Our carrier's liability only extends to the written declaration of value. Some of the items typically considered to be of extraordinary value are:

Antiques Art Collections

China Computer Software

Crystal Figurines

Firearms Furs

Manuscripts Oriental Rugs
Silver and Silverware Tapestries

Television or Stereos Video Cameras

If items of extraordinary value are included in your shipment, an Extended Protection Program form must be completed and signed by you prior to your move. Failure to complete or sign the Extended Protection Program form will limit our carrier's liability to \$.60 per pound, per article.

Delivery Responsibilities

When your shipment is delivered, it is your responsibility to check each item that is delivered against those listed in your inventory. If you notice any new damage (i.e. damage that did not exist when the shipment was loaded), make a notation of the new damage on the inventory in the "Exceptions at Destination" column. If any items on the inventory are not delivered, enter missing in the "Exceptions at Destination" column. These notations are necessary to prove a claim for loss or damage of your household goods.

The van operator who delivers your shipment is instructed to allow you sufficient time during delivery to inspect your goods and record any exceptions on the inventory. If, for any reason, you are not given the opportunity to inspect your goods and make exceptions, immediately contact the agency with which you arranged your move.
